Windward Passage

"One Drop of Water and the Waterfall"

One drop of water doesn't seem like much and in some sense it isn't. One drop of water won't save a person from dehydration. One drop of water won't save a plant or a tree from dying in the middle of a severe drought. One drop of water won't turn the turbines in a hydroelectric plant so as to produce electricity.

But we all know that one drop of water when combined with billions and trillions of others produces a huge amount of water that will do all of these things. Rainfall is nothing but tiny raindrops – sometimes so many you can't see through the rain more than a few feet. These are the types of raindrops that create rivers and waterfalls. These are the types of raindrops that provide life-giving water that sustains life.

December is the time of year we enter the Christmas season. One does not have to be Christian to understand and appreciate one of the powerful messages of the season – to open our hearts and extend ourselves and to give to others in need. Too often people of limited means think they cannot give to others because their gift would be too small and won't not have any effect. But this is just not true. Just like a drop of water, a small gift to charity may only make the tiniest of differences, but just like raindrops, when a small gift to a charity is combined with millions and billions of others it can make a huge difference. Imagine, for example, if each American gave only five dollars to a charity. Five dollars, by itself, would make very little difference but when multiplied by 300 million, it would equal \$1.5 billion which would make a huge difference.

As we enter this holiday season, consider giving to causes that make a difference in the world. Each of us has an obligation to make a difference in the world and each of us can give financially to others – even if our contribution is very modest. Together, we can make a waterfall.
